OUR PEOPLE




Professor Robin Phillips was a Resident Surgical Officer at St Mark's before becoming a Consultant Surgeon in 1987, followed by the hospital's Clinical Director from 2004. When he retired in 2017, a Research Fellow he had supervised was appointed as a St Mark's Consultant and inherited his patients.

This surgeon, Mr Phil Tozer, is now an international leader of complex proctology and leads the aptly named 'Robin Phillips Fistula Research Unit.' He has continued the tradition of supervising the next generation, and we welcomed back one of his Research Fellows, Mr Kapil Sahnan, as a Consultant in 2023.



It is deeply embedded in the hospital's culture to support and guide the next generation. This creates a virtuous circle of unbroken knowledge sharing between different generations of clinicians that manifests as excellent patient care and the potential for more research discoveries.

OUR INNOVATIONS



Mr Miskovic (left) and St Mark's Medical Co-Director and Consultant Colorectal Surgeon, Professor Omar Faiz (right), have collaborated on the development of robotic pouch surgery. Their colleagues before them, including surgeons Professor Robin Kennedy, Mr Ian Jenkins, and Mr Janindra Warusavitarne, developed approaches that have been important stepping-stones towards the current concept.

The Ileo-anal pouch was developed by surgeons from St Mark's in the 1970s. It remains a key option for patients with ulcerative colitis, a type of Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD), and familial adenomatous polyposis, a rare, inherited cancer predisposition syndrome.

St Mark's has recently undertaken pouch surgery using minimally invasive robotic technology, contributing new knowledge to an area of surgery it originally pioneered.



New advancements have been borne from St Mark's quest to improve patients' survival and health-related quality of life. The Ileo-anal pouch is a good example of how our continued and regular investment of time, resources, and expertise in a St Mark's-developed innovation has created a virtuous circle of improved patient outcomes.
